

# An amazing afternoon at Lambert Engineering at Tadcaster.

## Have you ever wondered what it is like inside a Rolls Royce engine?

On Friday 19th October Lambert opened their doors to invite schools and members of the public to have a look around to see what happens in the world of engineering and to encourage talented people of all ages to develop their interest and enthusiasm in the world of manufacturing. We thought that this was a great opportunity to see some of the most up to date and exciting technology at work, and not to be missed. It was absolutely amazing. There was a group of 5 children who went to discover what goes on at Lambert and to find out more about engineering and modern technology. As we arrived at Lambert, no one knew what was in store for us and we were totally amazed. The children used a computer to control a robot and made the robot move around and even kick a ball. They saw a huge sheet of metal being cut and shaped and even did *virtual welding*. It was very exciting and our scores were so good that we narrowly missed out on achieving the standard expected of an apprentice! One of the highlights was wearing the masks and entering into a virtual world where we stepped inside a Rolls Royce engine. It was an incredible and very strange experience to walk past huge cogs and then be able to take off parts of the engine to see what it was like and what was behind it. The whole experience was wonderful and we were very proud of the children who were great ambassadors and proudly represented the school.













# **WW1 CENTENARY**



The centenary of the First World War (2014 to 2018)

To commemorate the first world war and leading into the remembrance Sunday, we are dedicating the first week back after the holiday to learn about the *Great War* and to remember the men and families who made great sacrifices and the many who lost their lives. During the week (November  $5^{th} - 9^{th}$ ) children will have the opportunity to make poppies, read, research and find out about the wars and particularly the first world war. We will have manikins dressed in army clothes to show the uniforms worn by soldiers. There will be a lot of original items displayed in school and some replicas including guns, bullets and hand grenades. There will not be any *live* bullets and the guns etc. are quite safe. Children will only be able to handle any items under supervision to make sure that they are safe and there is no damage to the historical items. We **do** want the children to feel the weight of rucksacks, helmets, guns etc. and to learn about the war but we will avoid anything that may scare or frighten any children and by having guns in school we are emphasising the dangers of the weapons and we are not encouraging any interest in them, but quite the opposite.

On Friday from 3.30pm we will be opening up the displays in school for any parents, carers and grandparents to have a look at the world war 1 and world war 2 items. There will be lots to see including a parachute on the field.

At 4.15 pm there will be a demonstration of 3 big guns being fired. The guns will make a loud bang when they go off but they do not fire any ammunition and they are quite safe.

This is a significant moment in history as it is the centenary of the first world war and we hope that you will be able to come into school to share in the experience of remembering and find out more.

To give us an idea of numbers coming into school on Friday 9<sup>th</sup>, please return the slip at the back of the newsletter with the names of the people who are coming.

There will be a one minute silence in school on Friday 9<sup>th</sup> November.

On Sunday November 11<sup>th</sup> people are meeting on the foreshore at 6.45pm. The service will commence at 6.55pm with the playing of *the last post*. At 7pm the school choir will lead be singing *The Day thou Gavest Lord is ended*. We are hoping that this will be a special point of remembrance for all the community.
